REGISTRANTS

Form 100 is particularly important, since it is your first official statement to the draft board. It is essential that you understand how this form will affect you, and that you present your information accurately.

If you are opposed to the Vietnam War, or the draft in general, discuss

this form with a trained draft counselor before you file it.

Remember:

- 1. Seek information about the draft. Learn your rights. It is your best protection.
- You do not have to fill out Form 100 at your draft board. You can take it with you, and you have 10 days before you must file it.
- 3. If you have any questions, it is important that you discuss it with a draft counselor before you fill out the form.
- 4. Be sure to sign Series VIII, if it applies to you in any way. If you have doubts about signing the C.O. statement, talk with a counselor. A C.O. claim is made "by reason of religious training and belief." The courts have given a wide interpretation to the meaning of this clause. Do not exclude yourself if there is any chance you may be eligible.
- 5. You have a far higher chance of being granted a C.O. claim if you sign Series VIII now, rather than file a claim later.
- 6. A C.O. does 2 years of civilian work (at the same pay and with the same privileges as other employees), as an alternative to military service.
