Trustees Meeting

We are at the Trustees meeting today representing a large number of people in the Stanford-Kidpeninsula community who are anxious to see Stanford's involvement in the Vietnamese war end the rapidly escalating war in Thailand and Laos. A group of 200 people was to demand an immediate halt to all chemical/biological warfare research, research on some emergency operations for SE Asia, and the use of military aircraft in the region. of companies like Utah Mining and Construction, Hercules, and Union Oil (of Santa-Barbara firm) which profit from their control of resources and labor in SW Asia and elsewhere. They also control Stanford and Stanford Research Institute, both of which do some research primarily applicable to military equipment manufacturing by private controlled companies. SRI develops techniques and agents for chemical and biological warfare. In Bangkok and Mexico Park SRI develops counter-emergency operations to help the military get some liberation operations in countries where American capital is invested. It also researches and develops and has a collection of much of that equipment, etc.
