




We, the International Association, Foreign and American Students, feel the need very strongly to state our firm support to you students directly engaged in struggle with Stanford on SRI war activities.

TODAY'S TRUSTEE:

Dean Watkins

Dean Watkins is the living embodiment of what Stanford University has increasingly represented since World War II. He has performed many functions in the military-industrial-academic complex and will perform still more.

Watkins, a trustee since 1967, is or has been full professor of Electrical Engineering (given tenured position without teaching experience), assistant director of the AEL (appointed by Stanford vice-president Fred Terman along with Wm. R.Rambo); local Reaganite politician, local banker (director of the Stanford bank along with Fred Terman and Mr. Shirley Temple Black), employee of a giant defense electronics contractor (Collins Radio), employee of a military funded academic facility like SRI (Los Alamos Labs, N:Mexico), employee of a large aerospace company (Hughes Aircraft), consultant to the Pentagon (1956-66), chairman of the board of Watkins-Johnson Company (over 85 per cent of sales to U.S. Government agencies, 65 per cent directly to Department of Defense), and a cop (San Mateo County Mounted Reserve).

Watkins believes in socialized research and private profit. While working on Air Force contracts here in the Stanford Electronics Laboratories, he invented the helitron tube used in radar. Watkins and the Kern County Land Company set up Watkins-Johnson in the Stanford Industrial Park to produce the helitron. Fred Terman was made a director. So was William R. Hewlett.

Watkins-Johnson Company (W-J) employs over 650 people, none of whom are protected by collective bargining proceedures. W-J makes components for radar and electronic countermeasures systems.



Residents of South San Mateo
County have seen Watkins' performance on the Sequoia Union High School
Board, where his fundamentalist mentality destroyed any chance of solving
District racial problems. Watkins'
original plan of splitting off a
super-rich school district of Portola
Valley, Woodside, and West Atherton
from East Palo Alto failed completely
and he will not run for re-election
this Spring.

Watkins is the only common trustee of both Stanford and Cal, a friend of Reagan's, and a Rafferty supporter. Who says the Stanford trustees aren't interested in education?
