at 3 am when we arrived, there were three people talking to a lone policeman by his car in the driveway. 2 police with rifles were patrolling the area and there were SRI security police inside. A group of about 8 or ten arrived——I think they were plainclothes police. They were plainclothes police. They were had us leave the building because they didn't want anyone there whom they weren't responsible for.

at first a group of about 40 arrived and started to picket with signs peacefully in front of SRI. Some went to the in ersection and handed le flets to motorists stopped at the stoplight (hanover and Page Mill.) This was about 7 or shortly after.

At 7:05 another group of about 20 or 30 blocked one of the westbound lanes of Page Mill near the rear parking lot at SRI. most cars went around them to the other lane. One gold Dodge pickup truck woudn't go around. The driver tried to force his way through. Someone yelled at him and he and his companion (2 big men, probably 30 or under) got out of the car. Then they got back in and started to pull right into the people in the street. A couple of people pounded on the truck. This time the driver got out again. Phil says he had a knife. Another demonstrator said it was the size of a small steak knife.

A couple demonstrators dumped a cache of rocks in the bushes.

at about 7:30 the demonstrators moved pipes, signs, sawhorses, lumber from nearby construction as well as bushes into the street at this point by the rear parking lot, stopping both lanes. Another group of people stood in the parking lot in lines sort of parallel to the police lines. I guess this was to keep researchers from entering. 3 blue button characters were back there, too. There was a little shoving between 1 of them and 1 of the demonstrators when someone was taking a picture.

a small white car---Triumph, I, think---came barrelling up to the barricade, almost hitting several people on the way. The guy stop ed, but after a few minutes, he just ran right over the barricade. A saw horse got caught under the left side of his car, and he was off balance all the way up to the top of the hill where he stopped and pulled it loose.

at the barricade on Hanover, a white VW stati n wagon went around the edge of the barricade with 2 people on its hood, trying to stop it. They almost slipped off the front (and under the car.)

bill and margie 2-2-2-2

drivers a couple of times sought to avoid the Page Mill barricade by driving through the fields, but demonstrators stopped them each time.

A police bus arrived, and the people decided to peel off around the police as they approached.

A couple of people got in sort of an argument with a KRON (NBC) reporter in the parking lot of the \*\*Meekkx\*\*\* gas station. They were there in the first place because of the little scuffle with Harvey and his blue buttons, and Harvey's speech. They told the reporter that they couldn't insure his safety when things started to get rough, and they wished he would cooperate. He said, "You take care of your people and I'll take care of mine."

The cops moved out from there station under the SRI building in the driveway, and the people moved back. When the police began to move back slightly, and thex people moved back in, the People shouted, "Push 'em back, push 'em back! Way back!"

An orange sign and a red banner were hoisted on the two SRI flagpoles.

d umming on the ping pong table and a garbage can lid, and clapping, and shouting ho ho ho chi minh while the People were waiting for the cos to move. Lots of quiet before the storm.

Then the police moved in with the whole tear gas bit. We followed one gro p of the People who eventually ended up going up Page Mill. At the top of the hill, the Hewlett Packard employees were watching from behind their Cyclone fence. The cops had formed a line blocking the westbound lanes of traffic. A group of about ten epople were off to the side with some police and Mark was there. I assume they had been arrested. The People went into a field on a hill with tall grass, some of it cut. They started to head straight back for \*\*Exaktix\* S i, but Doron said there was a fence. He asked for af. gro s to gather and see who was missing. I think everyone ended up heading sort of north on the hill to California and Amherst. They split there——some to head for SRI, some to keep the cops busy at Calif. and Hanover. Doron sent a motorcycler out to find out where everyone was and what they could do.

On the way back and older (25?) man named Bryce McGlaughlin told Jeanne Friedman and Doron that he had seen a medic beaten for nothing. Hit on the left side of the face with a stick. They had him up against a wall. He did not reseist or provoke. Cops told his friend to get out or get arrested, too.

human interest

These were some of the reactions of motorists delayed in the early morning.

"I'm really shocked, bedause your destructive. You're so stupid all of you, I feel sorry for you. I feel sorry for your offspring." This was to comment of a lady who had been stalled for about fifteen minutes.

"I have a son who is a Jehovah's Witness, and he's going toj jail. I went to war twice because I felt the need. Everyone has the right to believe in what he wants, but this does not include blocking the street." This was a man who had been talking to demonstrators for five or term minutes.

The following is an interchange between a motorist and a member of A3M.

M"Is thei sensible?"

A3M We have tried sensible things. You have read about what the Trustees did in the newspaper."

Mot. "Do you really think you are helping your cause?

You are a stupid lot of ignorant bloody creeps."
