

'Comply,' Stanford Told

WASHINGTON — (UPI)— Senate investigators prodded Stanford University today to comply with a subpoena directing the school to supply a list of officers of 12 organizations allegedly involved in disorders on the campus.

Chairman John E. McClellan (D-Ark.) of the Permanent Investigations Subcommittee wrote to Stanford President R. S. Pitzer expressing disbelief that the university has no such list.

Urging Pitzer to cooperate, McClellan said it "seems

incompatible that, during a period when both the university and the (Stanford Research) Institute were targets of disruption by almost identical groups, the university should now state it has no knowledge of the existence of certain of these organizations and the identities of their officers."

Pitzer had declined to name the officers of the 12 organizations, contending in a letter to McClellan last Tuesday that "the university possesses no official records disclosing the identity of any

such organizations, if they do in fact exist."

McClellan also released a telegram from two Stanford alumni urging him to "use all measures within your authority" to require Pitzer to release the list.

Edward R. Borchert and Rouseville W. Schaum, former president of Stanford alumni clubs in Los Angeles and Orange counties, respectively, said the decision to "defy" the subcommittee was "intolerable."
