SUPPORT MCGOVERN-HATFIELD

Senators Hatfield and McGovern on national TV Tuesday evening asked for our support for their historic amendment, which would block military funds for Cambodia within 30 days of enactment and for Vietnam and Laos by December, 1970. The senators urged that postcards be written to top-priority senators and your own congressmen with the minimum message: "I SUPPORT THE MCGOVERN-HATFIELD AMENDMENT." Revised lists of top-priority senators are being circulated by the Democratic Means Committee. AUGUSTA ELICITS RAGE AND SORROW

Calls for condemnation of oppressive elements within American domestic policy and at the same time for redoubling efforts to terminate the Indochinese War now were issued to a general meeting of the Stanford Medical Community for Peace held Wednesday in the Medical School courtyard with 200 persons present.

To express the group's concern over oppression within American society, the following resolution was passed:

"We, the members of the Stanford Medical Community for Peace, do hereby voice our rage and sorrow at the actions leading to the death of six Black men in Augusta, Georgia. This tragedy, following so closely the events at Kent State, serves to emphasize our society's increasingly oppressive and murderous response to dissent. We further believe that the markedly different public reaction to the Kent and Augusta killings is a

CASE WESTERN RESERVE FACULTY DEPLORE WAR

The General Faculty of the School of Medicine of Case Western Reserve University has issued a statement deploring the war and calling for a re-ordering of federal priorities.

"Because of this crisis, the General Faculty...departs from our traditional position of silence on public issues. We deplore the war in Indochina and urge the President of the United States, his Cabinet and all members of Congress to re-examine the direction of their efforts to achieve peace."

"We also deplore the intensification of distrust and alienation of groups within our country. We urge that the federal priorities be re-ordered to mobilize our energies in the pursuit of common humanistic goals."

The statement was approved by a vote of 178 for, 50 against, and 9 abstentions.

SAN MATEO COUNTY MEDICAL SOCIETY COMMENDS SMCFP

The Board of Directors of the San Mateo County Medical Society has issued a resolution commending the Stanford students and faculty for "their interest in the welfare of the people, . . . their dedication to nonviolent action, . . . and their plans to use peaceful means to convey understanding of a viewpoint not only on campus but throughout the Bay area, state and nation."

They further stated, "We can express the hope and prayer that the United States will be able to withdraw from combat in Southeast Asia in the immediate future."

reflection of the profoundly racist nature of our society. As expression of our deep concern with these events:

- 1) We pledge to keep the Medical Center flags at half mast indefinitely.
- 2) We will send a letter to the Augusta city government requesting amnesty for all those arrested in the past week."

The resolution passed without objection.

The meeting later heard a strong plea from Dr. Frank Zboralske of the Department of Radiology for the entire medical school community to join together in a concerted effort to solicit widespread support for the McGovern-Hatfield appropriations amendment to end the Southeast Asian war systematically. Dr. Zboralske urged all those present to circulate petitions and encourage their friends to write congressmen urging passage of this bill when it comes before the Senate in the near future.

Final action of the meeting was passage of a resolution urging that the hospital follow the guidelines set forth in President Pitzer's letter of May 11 to all university employees. Under those guidelines, hospital employees would be encouraged to participate in activities related to the peace movement if they so wished, provided that their work schedule would be arranged not to jeopardize patient care.
