Pat Crowley gave a report on the television program. If we can get KQED time the program will be presented on KQED Thursday night, May 7. The program will be produced in Berkeley in cooperation with NEWSLAB, a student television production at Berkeley. The show will devote a half hour to Berkeley and a half hour to Stanford, giving information reports as to what is happening, historical reports, and in-depth analyses of the events.

This group also wants to work up an hour program which will give members of the University Community a chance to discuss the issues and which will aim to represent all sides. Right now they are looking for a place to produce this program, as this department lacks video-tape facilities capable of producing a broadcast-quality picture.

The radio information group has decided to get information out to the Midwestern schools about the Stanford Strike in 2 minute radio reports which they will phone in to the schools. Their central problem at the moment is funding for the phone bills. Suggestions raised for solving this problem include:

1. ASSU (has numbers for strike headquarters in other schools)
2. KZSU studios can be used...especially for getting information from other schools on tape.
3. Investigate the possibilities of local ham radio operators volunteering time for contacting other operators in the areas we are trying to reach. Long distance phone calls can be made this way very cheaply.
4. Use D.O.D. money left over from research (vetoed by faculty)
5. Turn the film student's production fund over...there is about \$800.00 in stock and cash in it.
