We think you'll find this stuff eats up a lot of people's time fast, so put out a loud call. We think you'll also find that the minute you stick your noses into the union and factory scene, the excitement grows logarithmically.

There are a hell of a lot of people upset with Nixon. More than you or we or they ever dreamed. Most of 'em think they're pretty much alone. Everybody thinks the other guy is that "Great Silent Majority" Nixon's always talking about — but when you get their heads together, they'll find that they're NOT alone.
