

On Monday, May 4, 1970, the Stanford Medical Community voted:

- I. To support the intent of the recommendations passed by the Academic Council of Stanford University in their meeting of May 1, 1970 in reference to the condemnation of the United States' involvement in Cambodia, the elimination of credit for ROTC by the end of the current academic year, and the condemnation of the use of violence as a political means wherever it occurs.
- II. Secondly it was stated:
 1. We, the assembled members of the Stanford Medical School faculty, students, and staff endorse the editorial in the Stanford Daily of May 4, 1970.
 2. We strongly support the nonviolent activities of all members of the University community who are engaged in protest against the war in Southeast Asia. We believe it to be our responsibility to bring the issue of the war in Southeast Asia to the conscience of the local and national community.
 3. We move that all activities of the Stanford Medical Center save those related to the care of patients or those considered necessary by each individual be redirected and that faculty, staff, students and administration organize and finance efforts to reach industry, labor and government to get the United States out of Southeast Asia by all democratic means possible including, if necessary, a general strike.
 4. Further, the ongoing direction of our energy should be considered at a meeting held this Friday, May 8, at 9 a.m. and at all other times necessary to respond to changes in our political situation.
