

Can we abolish ROTC at Stanford? The answer is blowing in the wind. This Monday and Tuesday, we are asking that you boycott your normal classes and participate in the Stanford Liberation College instead. Our Boycott is a blow which we strike for freedom and against repression—of our movement in particular and of our society in general. By boycotting "Stanford as usual" we are demonstrating to President Pitzer, the Trustees, and the Faculty Senate that we refuse to accept repression of radical political opposition to their policies on this campus. Pitzer is committed to protect ROTC by any means necessary: last Thursday's sit—in was not violent; the violent police action was against our political act, not our tactics.

But this boycott is as much a rejection of our own tendency to be cynical as it is a rejection of the Stanford hypocrisy that "at Stanford the winds of freedom blow". The Liberation College is a way for us to come together and grapple seriously with Stanford, ROTC, and our futures in a broader context than we have taken time to do so far—the context of ecclogy, economics, the war, and the student movement as a whole. In the four corners of the Old Union Courtyard over 50 discussions will take place in two days. "Love", "Land", "Bread", and "Peace" are our issues and the names of our "classrooms" there. It's wide open—if you want to lead a discussion, put up a marker somewhere in the lawn and do it. We hope that the Liberation College can generate a firmer committeent and strategy for abolishing ROTC.

Exhibits, guerilla theatre, a child-care center, literature tables and music will be on White Plaza and around the fountains. On Monday night we will move to the street between Wilbur and Branner for a street dance, and during the noon hour both days the San Francisco Mime Troop and Stanford Gorilla Theater will perform.

Tuesday evening, we will come together (haven't got a place yet) and decide whether to expand and intensify the Boycott into a Strike. If we can't do it, then we will need to devise an alternative strategy to OFF-ROTC. Our choices are fairly few--its really up to all of us to do all we possibly can to win.
