Super-high bids for construction of the planned animal research facility on Coyote Hill have set the project back, but apparently won't stop eventual completion of the complex on the easterly flank of the hill.

Robert Lindee, associate dean of administration at the Medical School, said that the project is still "very alive." However, he is currently analyzing the cost over-run with representatives of the University, Syntex Corporation and the architect.

Lindee declined to specify how much the construction bids, opened in late November, had exceeded the estimated costs of the project.
