Nearly 1600 women students, faculty, staff, and wives at Stanford sent a letter to President Nixon Wednesday, April 21, calling for total withdrawal of American forces from Southeast Asia.

Collected over the past three weeks by Stanford Community Women for Peace, the signatures represent the broadest expression of opinion by women on the war to date. Signers include Jing Lyman, wife of University President Richard W. Lyman; Diane Fields, member of the newly elected Associated Students Council of Presidents; Barbara Dornbusch, wife of faculty Senate Chairman Sanford Dornbusch; Joy Napier, wife of B. Davie Napier, dean of the chapel; Jewelle Gibbs, wife of Undergraduate Studies Dean James Gibbs; and Prof. Eleanor Maccoby.

"We not only want Americans to stop dying; we want them to stop killing," the letter states. "We are convinced that only when all American forces are withdrawn can there be hope of peace in Southeast Asia and progress at home."

The women's letter notes that "Some of us believed you when you promised, before your election, that you would bring a rapid end to American involvement in Vietnam.

"It now appears that you intend to keep American support troops and air power in Southeast Asia indefinitely, believing that as long as American casualties are kept at a low level, people like us will be content.

"We are not content. We are appalled by such adventures as the Laos invasion. We are sickened by the racism of your assumption that the loss of Asian lives is morally preferable to the loss of American lives."

Signers included 636 students, 581 staff members, 50 faculty members, 148 faculty wives, 89 student wives, and 27 staff wives, plus 44 alumnae and friends.

Copies will be sent every U.S. Senator and several Representatives, including all women members of Congress. The original, including 135 pages of signatures, will go to the White House.

Stanford Community Women for Peace is a voluntary group formed in response to the Laotian invasion earlier this year. -30-

A seminar on business ethics sponsored by students at Stanford's Graduate School of Business will be the subject of a one-hour program on television station KQED at 8 p.m. Monday, April 26.

The program will show videotape segments of small group discussions between executives and students from 10 leading U.S. business schools on problems of corporate and individual social responsibility. Held in March, the seminar was put on by the Committee for Corporate Responsibility, a volunteer student organization concerned with encouraging greater social involvement by business.

A chief outcome of the meeting was formation of a "National Affiliation of Concerned Business Students."
