## LABOR - STUDENT SYMPOSIUM

Students and labor will jointly discuss the problems affecting both groups that are caused by the war in Southeast Asia and their solutions at a conference in the Physics Lecture Room, Rm. 100, on June 27. The event is being cosponsomed by the Santa Clara Central Trades and Labor Council and the Stanford Medical Community for Peace.

Some of the problems which the participants will consider are our deep involvement in a costly wer in the Far East, the conversion of the U.S. economy to a wartime economy, the increasingly tough fight of labor unions over wages merely to stay even with the losses caused by inflation, and the turmoil among students and at universities over national goals and pricri-

The morning session will hear the

following speeches:

"The War in Southeast Asia", Harris Martin, assistant professor of Asian Studies at San Jose State.

"The impact of the War on the Economy", Douglas Korty, research economist at the Pacific Studies Center.

"The War and Organized Labor", Einar Mohn, western director of the Teamsters Union.

A pagel discussion, "The University and the War", will feature panelists Dwight Simpson, professor of political science at San Francisco State; Alan S. Manne, professor of economics at Stanford; Norm Goodman, student in polimical schence; and Art Carter, secretary-breasurer of the Contra Costa Central Mrades and Labor Council.

Afternoon workshops will attack problems centering around the impact (continued in Column 2)

of the war on health care services, political strategies and tactics, conversion to a peacetime economy, and a labor-student coalition for a progressive society. ## MARQUETTE FACULTY ADOPT RESOLUTION

A resolution signed by 68 faculty members of Marquette School of Medicine, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, calls for "immediate cessation of all aggressive action" and urges Congress and the administration to withdraw forces "as quickly as transpor-

tation can be arranged"

They states, We do not prefend to be military experts, ans we are not evaluating military stratedy or the possibility of successful 'Vietnamization' ... We are convinced that our country is not accomplishing any of the traditional ideals of the United States and that our government is in reality following an immoral policy of seeking political and economic advantages by military means."

The statement, sent to President Mixon and Wisconsin Senators and Representatives, is one of many which have come from medi-

cal groups in recent weeks.
