

# LODGE IS COMING

Monday, January 11, Henry Cabot Lodge will be speaking in Dinkelspiel Auditorium at Stanford University.

While the government is prosecuting men like Lieutenant Calley for "war crimes" in Vietnam, the real criminals -- Henry Cabot Lodge and the class of men that he epitomizes -- go free.

Lodge, as ambassador to Vietnam, Paris negotiator, and U.S. ambassador to the Vatican, has played a crucial part in implementing U.S. policy. More important is his role in formulating that policy. As early as 1951, Lodge, before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, advocated added support for the French.

As Lodge comes to Stanford, the War is intensifying -- despite the pullback of ground combat troops. According to the New York Times (January 9, 1971), "B-52's throughout Indochina now drop the equivalent of 2 1/2 Hiroshimas a month." More realistic estimates range to ten times that much. Unless protest increases Nixon may expand the bombing from Laos-Cambodia-South Vietnam to saturation bombing of North Vietnam.

Lodge's visit offers us the opportunity to protest U.S. policy and focus on one of the men most responsible for the U.S. invasion of Vietnam.
