

NIXON'S THE ONE

WAR Nixon says he's for peace. He broke off the Paris talks unilaterally, he escalates the air war in Vietnam with massive saturation bombing, attacks Hanoi and Haiphong in a desperate, insane attempt to break the will of the Vietnamese people. He ignores the seven-point peace proposal presented by the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam. These proposals pledge to release all POW's when Nixon sets the date for total withdrawal.

RACISM Nixon says he's for "racial equality." He escalates his repression against the people—Black and Brown and Asian people first of all. Police violence continues unabated: John Henry Smith, Jr. in San Jose, Gregory White in East Menlo Park, Clarence Johnson in San Francisco, Reuben Salazar in Los Angeles... San Quentin... Attica...

REPRESSION Nixon says he's against inflation. He freezes wages, attacks the collective bargaining rights of the working people (as he did against the Longshoremen), while prices soar and taxes rise. Black and Brown people are the most deeply wounded by his New Economic Policy. He has attacked the farm workers by challenging their most effective political and economic weapon—the boycott. He has launched repressive terror against Mexican-born workers in California. He uses the school busing issue as a way of dividing the people—Black from Brown from Asian from white.

UNITY IS THE KEY

The time is long overdue for all in the peoples' movement to join forces in a single thrust. The Attica prisoner said it: "We have found the key—the key is unity." Unity of the Black, Brown, Asian, and Native American Liberation movements with all working people, all who favor an immediate end to the slaughter in Southeast Asia, all who favor the freedom of all political prisoners.

The peoples' movements dumped Johnson in 1968.

The movements against the war and racism and for the freedom of all political prisoners will dump Nixon in 1972.

We have already tasted the first fruits of our collective labors:

- The release of Angela Davis on bail.
- The acquittal of Luis Talamantez, a Chicano brother in San Quentin accused by prison guards of assault.
- The acquittal of the two surviving Soledad Brothers, John Clutchette and Fleeta Drumgo, who must now receive massive support demanding their immediate release.
- The hung jury in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

The trials of many political prisoners are underway or will begin shortly:

- Angela Davis in San Jose, California.
- Billy Dean Smith, a Black GI in Fort Ord, California.
- Gary Lawton in Riverside, California.
- The San Quentin Six and Ruchell Magee in San Rafael, California.
- Hugo Pinell in Monterey County, California.
- Earl Justice and Larry Gibson in San Rafael, California.

RALLY AGAINST WAR, RACISM, AND REPRESSION

San Jose on May 20th

- * Free Angela and all political prisoners.
- * End the bombing in Indochina now; Nixon must set a date for total withdrawal.
- * End racial oppression and police violence against Black, Brown, and Asian people.
- * End the wage freeze and all attacks on working people.
